At the turning of the year, we consider beginnings. We approach the new year as both a continuation of time and as a fresh, blank page in the book of life.

Let us also consider a different starting point: the spiritual beginning of humanity and selfhood. All around the world, people tell origin stories about how human beings came into existence. People have been fashioned out of clay and breath and all sorts of organic, natural elements combined with divine creativity.

Too often we have been taught, especially by our own religion, that our human origins are rooted in brokenness, sin, separation, and downfall. Of course, I'm not going to claim that we aren't messy, mistake-making, vulnerable beings. Yes, we are often hurt, disconnected, and off center. Yet as humans, though we are imperfect, we are also curious, creative, compassionate and resilient. Or as one wisdom saying goes, "perfect is the enemy of the good."

Happily, many theologians understand that humanity's condition begins with goodness: it's our starting point, our baseline, our template. Although Judaism, Christianity and Islam share similar origin stories, they don't all interpret the story — such as the events in the Garden of Eden — the same way. Some teachings within Christianity have burdened us with that idea that we start out sinful, evil, bad and broken. Yet listen to the language of Genesis ... at every step in the cycle of creation, "God saw that it was good." As a species, we come from origins that are inherently good!


Likewise, our individual inception, development and growth is positive. One of my favorite passages highlights our value in the eyes of God. Here is an excerpt from Psalm 139. "¹ O LORD, you have searched me and known me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far away. You search out my path and my lying down, and are acquainted with all my ways. Even before a word is on my tongue, O LORD, you know it completely. You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me…¹³ For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; that I know very well."

And here's one more reminder of our human potential. In the gospel of John, and other parts of the Bible, we are urged to become "children of light."

As we enter 2019, let us recall the promise that we revisited during Advent just days ago. Our basic design is one filled with goodness. In God's eyes, we are inherently wonderful. And through the lens of the story of Emmanuel — God with Us — we are also embraced as heirs to the light: we are children of light.

Do you have an iPod that you don't use anymore? A group of young volunteers is collecting gently used iPods and other MP3 players for the 45 residents at the Merriman House in North Conway. Merriman House will use them with their MUSIC & MEMORY® program, which brings personalized music into the lives of their residents. The program helps those with dementia (or other illness) to unlock memories and reconnect with the world. According to Dan Cohen, the Executive Director of MUSIC & MEMORY®, "Connecting people with their favorite music improves the quality of their life. Moods brighten, fewer antipsychotic drugs are needed, and bonds are renewed, joy ensues."

The iPod drive will run until every resident has his or her own player and playlist. Merriman House will gratefully accept new and gently used devices, iTunes gift cards, iPods, MP3 players or gently used phones, with or without chargers. The only criterion is that the equipment works. For hygiene reasons, used headphones are not accepted. Therefore headphones donated will need to be brand new. If you prefer to donate money, checks can be made out to "Merriman House" and mailed to Merriman House, Memorial Hospital, 3073 White Mountain Highway, North Conway, NH 03860. Please put "Music & Memory" in the memo section of the check.


Successful Church Collections

The Mission Committee held a successful Alternative Christmas Sale after church services in the beginning of December selling Heifer and Zimbabwe cards. They also changed things up a bit this year and held a collective UCC's 5 for 5 fundraiser in November.

- \$65 was sent to support Ukama programs in Zimbabwe including Hunger, Education, Scholarships, Water, Construction and Aids.
- \$325 was sent to purchase animals through Heiffer International to help lift families out of poverty and become self sustaining.
- \$360 was sent to help aid with the California fires.
- \$337 was sent in to the UCC Collection One Great Hour of Sharing.
- \$237 was sent in to the UCC Collection Strengthen the Church.
- \$300 was sent in to the UCC Collection Christmas Fund.
- \$267 was sent in to the UCC Collection Neighbors in Need.

Thank you to all who participated in these projects and collections.

Honduras Hope



Meg Phillips, a Jackson Community Church member, is preparing to go to Honduras in late January. She will join members of the non-profit **Honduras Hope**, who travel to the sister communities of Plan Grande and San Jose de Machigua, as well as the city of Yoro, four times each year.

Honduras Hope is a 501(c)(3) organization working to create stronger, more resilient, and self-sufficient communities in rural Honduras. The board is 100% volunteer. Those who travel pay all their own travel expenses.

Members work regularly in Honduras with the local community leaders to ensure that programs and efforts are a partnership

that empowers individuals, strengthens the communities and creates opportunities for an improved quality of life.

Checking baggage on flights to and from Honduras is expensive, so Meg is carrying one 50 lb. duffel with items that are small and lightweight, to have the most impact.

Starting with donated yarn, knitting needles, pencils, new LL Bean backpacks, and a couple of donated digital cameras, she would like to add <u>embroidery floss</u>, <u>embroidery needles</u>, <u>crochet hooks</u>, <u>toothbrushes</u>, <u>and lightweight medical supplies such as sterile gauze pads and bandaids</u>.

Your \$ donations will also be put to good use, since purchasing in Honduras helps to support their local economy.

The school year begins at the end of January, so on this trip we will take the high school students shopping for their uniforms, shoes and school supplies they will need for the year. Shoes can cost up to \$40 a pair. They have to be sturdy for the long walks on dirt roads to and from school. Uniforms are required, this year HH will outfit about 75 children at a cost of \$175-\$200 apiece.
