

United Church of Christ Special Mission Offerings sponsor vital ministries that bring hope to people in the U.S. and around the world. Our church has identified four areas where critical human needs exist:

- in places lacking health and educational resources and/or where disaster has struck;
- within systems of injustice which oppress daily life and opportunity;
- in the lives of church leaders without sufficient resources to live with dignity;
- in the nurture of youth and congregations just beginning their lives of faith.

We believe these Special Mission Offerings collectively serve to lift people closer to the abundance and wholeness to which Jesus Christ has called us to work together to bring about. Typically, in past years we have asked for donations 5 times throughout the year. We are trying a different method where we will ask for donations only twice a year, in the spring and the fall. We will have envelopes available and all the different funds we support will be listed. We hope you will carefully consider the options, and generously support the funds you choose.



Channels resources for international programs in health, education and agricultural development, emergency relief, refugee ministries, and both international and domestic disaster response, administered by Wider Church Ministries, Global Sharing of Resources.



Re-imagines and builds the future of the UCC. Way Station

WAY STATION: A Day Resource Center

Although the Way Station does not provide overnight shelter, they can offer access to services for people who need the basics: laundry, showers, internet access, PO Box for identification and mail, toiletries, small storage lockers, emotional support, and referrals.

VOLUNTEER: Upcoming Training Sessions

- Volunteers working with guests must be 21 and older
- Younger volunteers fill leadership and advisory roles, may work on-site at times when guests aren't present, pack and prep 'Boxes of Love' (toiletry & emergency supply kits).
- All volunteers working with guests offer hospitality and active listen skills.
- Navigators trained for this role meet with guests and can make referrals.

To volunteer, provide your contact info by email for orientation and training. Background check will be required for volunteers working with guests. Way Station will cover the cost of this process. Next training sessions are Sunday May 5th, 2pm & Sunday May 19th, 2pm. Please email waystationnh@gmail.com if interested.

Boxes of Love Program

The Northern Carroll County Provider Network's (NCCPN) mission is: "To network, strategize and implement solutions to address community needs." Group members are working to enhance community awareness of extreme poverty and homelessness in the valley.

Aside from building awareness, our main purpose is to recognize, appreciate and address the needs of individuals and families via outreach and distribution of boxes. We hope that in doing so we will increase opportunities to link people to services and measure the magnitude of the problem in our valley.

Our vision is the be able to provide donated goods to: Elderly and disabled; Homelessness; Unaccompanied youth/teens and Families with children. The following is just a brief list of items needed.

Storage: Duffle Bags, 5 gallon bucket (store items, lug water, with garbage bag/liner/seat could use for toilet), Backpacks, Large Ziplock bags (all sizes are helpful)

Sleeping: Tent, Sleeping Bag, Sleeping mat, Hammock, Headlamp/flashlight, Tarp, Cord/rope


Food: Cooler, Aluminum Foil, Bottled water, Juice boxes, Nuts, Protein Bars, Canned tuna/ckn, Granola bars, Oatmeal, Instant Breakfast, Noodles, Hot cocoa/tea, Glucose tablets, Beef Jerky, MRE (Freeze dried meals found at Army Barracks), Can opener, Mess Kit, Plastic wear

Hygiene: Towel, Toilet paper, Toothbrush/paste, Deodorant, Razor, Body Wash, Gold bond, Sunscreen, Feminine Hygiene, Diapers, Band-aids, Neosporin, First Aid Kit, Wipes, Paper Towels

Clothing: Socks, Hat, Gloves, Hand warmers, Reflective wear arm band, Poncho, Sweatshirt

Collection sites so far are Town of Conway Assistance Office, Conway Elementary and Sister Crows.

Jackson Community Church Dinner for Seven/Eight

Please consider joining us for Dinner for 7/8 which we will be organizing in May for the next year. Everyone who has participated has loved it and made new friends or became better acquainted with other church members.

Here is how it works:

Seven or eight people will comprise your dinner group. You will meet for dinner at each home on a rotating basis three or four times during the year. Each group can make their own plans to accommodate individual schedules. Even If you are not around all the time, the group can usually find a meeting time good for everyone.

Dear Members of our North Country Community,

On Sunday, May 5 at 4 PM, the Bethlehem Hebrew Congregation, in partnership with the Bethlehem Colonial Theatre, will join venues all over the world to present the documentary film Who Will Write Our History as BHC's annual observance of Holocaust Days of Remembrance.

In November 1940, days after the Nazis sealed the 450,000 Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto, a secret band of journalists, scholars and community leaders decided to fight back. Led by historian Emanuel Ringelblum, this clandestine group, known by the code name Oyneg Shabes, vowed to defeat Nazi lies and propaganda, not with guns or fists, but with pen and paper. Now for the first time, their story is told as a feature documentary written, produced, and directed by Roberta Grossman with Executive Producer Nancy Spielberg. This documentary features the voices of three-time academy award nominee Joan Allen and academy award winner Adrien Brody.

This presentation is free and open to our North Country Community.
