Friends—

The first chilly nights of September bring a cold splash after the heat, storms, and winds of August. Gardens flower, overrun with tomatoes and other abundance. Berries have come and gone. Now apples ripen to fullness, zucchini thrives, and corn grows golden beneath its green husk and tawny silk.

Who eats these crops flourishing on branch and vine — bears, birds, or people — depends on who gets to the garden and orchard first. Fresh in the palm, a scrumptious explored in a new recipe, or preserved for later—these crops

baked into something scrumptious, explored in a new recipe, or preserved for later ... these crops carry sunlight and hope in their ample presence. Some remnants fall to the ground: bruised, overripe, trampled, rotten ... offering themselves to the renewal of the earth.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

Change flourishes. Our community church balances adapting to social distance and remote worship, while now exploring safe ways to cautiously reopen and gather again. Communally, we seek to live with common values and concerns, though so much social and cultural stress promotes division. We remind each other that we can thrive in the midst of disagreement, because our differences give us greater strength and depth, and our diversity becomes the fertile ground for our greatest growth and possibility.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

Every story from the Acts of the Apostles, which we studied throughout late in summer, reminds us that the holy tent — the church, the community of faith, and God's world filled with people and creatures and interconnected ecosystems — only gets larger with every interaction. We are liberated, just as we become tethered to others, creating community with people from different perspectives, ethnicities, races, gender identities, social positions, economic resources, and belief systems. Just when we have it figured out, everything shifts. Our knowledge and experience, our assumptions and systems, are routinely challenged, reinvented, and overturned. The Holy Spirit moves beyond and outside our categories, language, and frameworks of understanding. Yes, God is bigger than our words and ideas, and God's love is more complete and comprehensive and filled with grace than we could dream. The refrain in this letter comes from the stories of the early church, as recounted in Acts, and the recurring themes we find in them. We will find these themes echoed again in the letters mailed by Paul to different early Christian communities scattered around the 'ends of the world'.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

Around us, the world remains chaotic, yet filled with potential. Lives have been irrevocably changed by global pandemic, social shifts, political uncertainties, and economic upheavals. Individual circumstances have also been both catastrophic and creative. In our own communities and across the nation, we witness measurable forms of social and systemic transformation. Our environment signals resilience as worldwide traffic and pollution declines and life returns to waterways and winds, then reminds us by fire, flood, and storm, that we will suffer or thrive in direct correlation to the earth's wellbeing.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

Has church even been cancelled during this time? Never. Has holy love failed to flow into the world as a vital, living presence? Never.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

The front doors to the sanctuary have remained open 24/7. The offices have been workplaces throughout the past several months. Meanwhile, our church started virtual worship, choir and educational programming, connecting children and adults from several states. We've developed new study groups. We've deepened civic partnerships as we address social justice issues: food insecurity, homelessness, and racial awareness, for instance. We continue to reach out to International partners, supporting other communities, too. Virtually, we form bonds that defy geography and time zones: linking states and nations in common experiences of worship and learning. Locally, we call each other, go for walks, drop off care packages.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

The church has become creative. Walls, roof, and building don't define us. We express our faith beyond these walls. Virtually. Hands-on. Every day. Every week. Peace flags. Ringing bells. Hopeful messages. Sign boards. Honest public prayers. Conversations. Study. Games. Phone calls. Care packages. Rides. Relationships. Meals. Songs. Cards. Letters. Stockings. Blankets. Masks. Flowers. Gardens. Hikes. Walks. Smiles. Connections.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

Yet we yearn to gather in person. By this month, we're finding ways to keep company — adults and youth — in small groups and more formal settings. We continue to modify how to gather, in person, as responsibly as possible. We meet outdoors at the pavilion and indoors in our own sanctuary to talk, pray, and worship together. We walk hiking trails and local sidewalks. We sit down in green outdoor spaces to socialize with care for safety. For the foreseeable future, we also continue to meet on Zoom, as a sustainable choice for those who cannot risk gathering in person. People continue to volunteer, every week, in areas where we have committed to specific mission such as food pantries, meal deliveries, and work with our homeless population at the Way Station. We also care and connect to each other in new ways: becoming more vital and vibrant in our bonds to each other, in response to the lapse of pre-Covid rhythms, routines, and connections.

We need each other. We belong to each other.

As much as we may meet some needs, we also disappoint each other. Often we get it right. Other times we get it wrong. Despite our best efforts or intentions, we fall short. We reveal our humanity.

We need each other. We belong to each other.


So the challenge and opportunity of these times is to love each other, being grateful when we get it right. Also to offer compassion and patience, knowing we will sometimes disappoint each other. We serve God's holy love with our hands, feet, hearts, minds, and voices, yet we are mortal vessels. Thus we are also messy and imperfect in our understanding, engagement, and implementation. Bound to make mistakes along the way. Let us also cultivate the courage and vision to fail, then get up, and try again.

APPROACHING THE NEW NORMAL: WORSHIPPING DURING COVID-19

We have begun an abbreviated church service on Sundays at 9:15 am. The following guidelines will be enforced for the health and safety of all who join us in person:

- Masks will be required for everyone entering the church and are to be worn at all times. Worship leaders may remove masks when speaking to the congregation.
- We will use only designated open pews. Please note that 2 out of 3 pews are roped off for safe distancing.
- Only families or attendees in a joint quarantine bubble who have already been in close proximity may sit together.
- We will ask you to refrain from any physical contact including passing of peace, handshaking, hugs, or standing within 6 feet of others. This is for everyone's safety.
- We ask that you use hand sanitizer when entering the building. There is also hand sanitizer in the pews as needed.
- Worship will be streamlined with scripture, prayer and live music by Alan Labrie (if he is able to arrive while worship is still in session).
- There will be no congregational singing.
- When worship ends, participants are asked to leave the church with social distance between each group; we will immediately be preparing for the next zoom-based 10:30am worship service.
- If you have any signs of illness such as fever, cough, congestion, stomach upset, you are courteously asked to remain home and take care of yourself.

We will continue to offer our Zoom-based Worship at 10:30am. This worship will be broadcast live via the Jackson Community Church Facebook page as well as on the website.

Traces of the Trade Film Screening & Discussion

Co-sponsored by the Jackson Library and JCC. This New England based documentary screened at the Sundance Film Festival and has been featured on PBS Point of View. It traces a journey by several cousins into the dark past of the slave trade which enriched their white

New England family. Dain Perry, one of the nine cousins, and his wife, Constance, screen the film and facilitate a conversation on race, reconciliation and healing. Traces of the Trade is both a geographical and psychological retracing of the industry of the largest slave traders in American history, the DeWolf family of Bristol, RI, and an exploration into racism in America, a legacy of slavery that continues to negatively impact the country even today. A primary debunked myth is that the North was the center of the abolition movement and had little to do with slavery. The fact is that the North was the center of the US slave trade, and the ownership of slaves in the north was not only common, but it lasted for over two hundred years. Join us for a film and conversation facilitated by the family members who participated in making the documentary.

Upcoming

All Eyes Upon Us: Racial Struggles in the Northeast from Jackie Robinson to Deval Patrick.

Thurs, Oct 8th via Zoom: From Brooklyn to Boston, from World War II to the present, Jason Sokol traces the modern history of race and politics in the Northeast. Why did white fans come out to support Jackie Robinson as he broke baseball's color barrier in 1947 even as Brooklyn's blacks were shunted into segregated neighborhoods? How was African-American politician Ed Brooke of Massachusetts, who won a Senate seat in 1966, undone by the resistance to desegregation busing in Boston?

Church Maintenance





You may have noticed some activity at the church from the Building and Maintenance team, along with some wonderful volunteers.

Completed:

- Our custodian/ cleaning lady Valarie noticed some mildew happening in the small bathroom in Fellowship hall. Church member and plumber, Huntley Allan, came down to inspect the area and noticed that our hot water tank had failed. With a quick email approval from council, Huntley promptly replaced the faulty tank. Thank you Huntley. We still have some sheet rock that will need to be replaced. Any volunteers?
- Volunteer Bob Carper volunteered his time and equipment to power wash the side of the Parish House. It looks great!! Thank you Bob.

To Be Completed:

- The outside stairs to the second floor is in need of repair. The steps are pulling away from the stringers and pose a safety hazard and the railings are not up to code. At the August Council meeting it was approved to have a work day to replace with a composite decking for the treads and bring the hand railing up to code. With a team of volunteers this is tentatively scheduled for the weekend of October 3rd and 4th.
- The Building Team received a quote to install electric heating tape to the part of the roof facing
 the Wentworth condos that has been causing large ice dams that have caused damage to the
 inside of the building a couple of years in a row. This was approved at the August Council
 meeting and will be completed this fall.

Many people contribute to the care and maintenance of this building: caring for flower boxes and plantings, 'dressing up' the doors for the season, tidying the sanctuary and front entrance, maintaining our racial justice lending library, changing the messages on the sign board and so many other details! We thank Huntley, Bob and a dozen other volunteers like Joan & Paul, Joyce, Wendy, Claire and so many others!
