In ways both figurative and practical, we embrace this season filled with plentitude:



MAKING A DIFFERENCE ... locally and internationally



The Mission Committee's 6th Annual Plant Sale was a HUGE success! We couldn't have done it without YOU though!

Many thanks to those of you who donated beautiful plants, seedlings, pots or who volunteered time to water, set up / take down the sale, or who helped find good homes for the plants, etc.

Many thanks also go out to those of you who are giving homes to these plants. May they bring you much beauty, satisfaction, yummy-ness, or all three!

The sale raised \$1800. The recipients of the funds are The Way Station, Church World Services, and Honduras Hope. We know it will be put to good use in each organization; helping to provide shelter to those in need.

Locally: The Way Station

Who is homeless in the Mount Washington Valley? Teenagers couch-surfing with friends. Families doubled up in apartments or living in hotels or cars. Adults camping in the woods all winter. People living in rough shelters without water, heat or basics. Homelessness is invisible in the valley, but it lives here.

Although the Way Station does not provide overnight shelter, they offer access to services for people who need the basics: laundry, showers, PO Box for identification, phones and phone cards, toiletries, emergency food, wellness calls and check-ins, advocacy and referrals to other services and resources.

Nationally: Church World Services (CWS)

At the border there is a desperate humanitarian crisis in Central America, where violence and corruption are forcing thousands of families to flee in search of safety for their children. Many seek asylum in the United States, though they are increasingly turned away or forced to wait in dangerous border regions of Mexico.

When those who enter U.S. custody are released to await a court date with the U.S. government, a network of CWS supported respite shelters welcomes them with open arms and much needed services: a warm place to sleep, good food to eat, a chance to bathe and space to rest. They are given clothing, hygiene items and other necessities. They are helped to call their loved ones to tell them that they are safe.

Internationally: Honduras Hope

Honduras Hope is a New Hampshire—based non-profit, 501c3 charitable organization. They are 100 percent volunteer and travel to sister communities four times per year. The contributions of so many each year support a variety of programs in the Honduran communities of Plan Grande, San Jose de Machigua and Yoro.

Honduras is one of the poorest countries in the western hemisphere. More than two thirds of the population live in poverty on less than \$4 per day, and almost twenty percent of the population lives on less than \$1.25 per day. Poverty rates are higher among rural and indigenous people, the Population Honduras Hope serves.

News and updates

The Way station has announced that they will be expanding their services to include Tri-County Community Action (TCCAP) services starting Monday, June 7th. The TCCAP case management team will be able to help support clients on their journey to housing stability. In addition the Way Station was the recipient of a significant non-perishable food donation to help those in need.

An example of who the way station serves and how:

The last week in May they served 38 individuals and families. (16 lacked housing, 5 housed in hotels, 13 housed in homes or trailers and 4 have unknown living situations). They provided 14 food bags, 18 gas cards, 8 phone cards, 28 laundry cards and pods, 12 rolls of toilet paper, 3 tents and sleeping bags, along with warm and smiling faces to greet the guests.

Did you know....

The Charitable IRA Rollover, also known as a Qualified Charitable Disbursement (QED) allows Americans age 70 ½ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator

directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!
