Friends —

The sap is running. Dripping. Flowing. The earth knows more than we do, sooner, and tells us so, as the trees awaken. Life persists. Love is walking in the world.

In some tender places, the first bright blossoms have broken through soft earth. Though the bird feeders should be taken down by now, some are

not, and the spring-winged pairs come to eat. To preen. To call. To build. To create new generations.

Already, as snow melts away, paw prints write a muddy poem on the land. We'll find, if we pay attention, signs that reveal restless creatures, hungry and lank, eager to replenish depleted energy.

Life is stirring all around us. Rising green. Rising hungry. Rising.

Annie Dillard says in one of her poems:

God empties himself into the earth like a cloud. God takes the substance, contours of a man, and keeps them, dying, rising, walking, and still walking wherever there is motion. — Annie Dillard

Motion. Yes, the world is stretching herself. Reaching up. Reaching out. Reaching. Beings, tame and wild, prowl. Migrate. Fly. Amble. Hunt. Feed. Argue. Nest. Blink. Dance. Give birth. Sing. Seek.

This activity includes us, the human ones who are also feeling the change of seasons, here in the north country of New Hampshire and in so many other places. We're bringing in bird feeders. Planning our gardens. Clearing the muck and mess as winter recedes. Shedding layers. Standing, eyes upturned, to watch the scudding clouds, frisky wind, playful birds, and budding world.

One prophet, imagining exiled people returning to their homeland, wrote in Isaiah 39, *"The wilder-ness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing."*

Of course, the world may be singing around us. Yet it is also groaning. Pain and sorrow are part of this season, too. Grief. Violence. Hunger. Death. They are part of the headlines in our times. And they are also part of the holy story we study at this time of year.

Let the stories we tell each year, as we follow the Way of the Messiah, lead us from Palm Sunday's celebration through moments of betrayal and oppression, to acts of kindness and justice, pausing with death, grief, and absence, then waking to Easter's resurrection.

May our focus on the full spectrum of human experiences shared during Passion Week restore resilience and renewal within us. There's even one story about Mary Magdalene who goes to the borrowed tomb, and finds it empty. Distraught, confused, she weeps. Then she realizes she's not alone. Someone else is with her. She mistakes the risen Messiah for a gardener.

Imagine meeting the Messiah in your spring garden? Leaving muddy footprints in your just-bare earth? Startling you and the creatures around you, so the birds flit away, their songs interrupted? Surprising you? A person whose shape, whose face, ought to be familiar, but remains beyond recognition? Someone you couldn't have expected to find so close to you? Almost within reach? Utterly transformed?

Love comes back to us in this season. Walks through the garden of the world. Names us. Returns to us.

May this deep, abiding, death-overturning Love at the heart of our faith make itself known to you. May it rise, may it flow. May the voice of God's world sing your name in a new way, so that you are known to yourself all over again. Beloved. Child of God. Chosen.

May you share that song with others.

May you and I be changed by the Holy Week story. May it find its way into our beings.

May each of us hum the song of Life that persists, taste the sweetness of Love that rises, and reach. Reach for each other. Reach toward the waking world. Touch each other's hearts tenderly, and touch this world intentionally: bearers of Easter's hope.

Our partner church in Zimbabwe is nearing the last stages of completing the roof on the church they are building.

It will cost about \$26,000 for the last truss, the roofing materials and supplies and the machinery to erect and complete the roof. The Mission Committee has \$4,600.00 that can be sent to them to help complete the roof.

As a Lenten project, we would like to involve the congregation in helping to raise funds to help Raise the Roof. People who choose to participate may:

- Set aside \$1 per day (or the cost of a cup of coffee) during lent
- Choose another daily amount to set aside each day
- Donate a specific amount toward the Raise the Roof project.

This money would be added to the funds provided by the Mission Committee and make a big difference to our friends in Zimbabwe.

If you are interested in participating, please track your savings during Lent or simply make your onetime donation. Did you know....

The **Charitable IRA Rollover**, also known as a **Qualified Charitable Disbursement (QED)** allows Americans age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!
