Friends & Neighbors -

All this month, as we move toward Lent, which begins Feb 22nd, Ash Wednesday, we're studying the core prayer of our faith: the Lord's Prayer. It's also sometimes called the 'Our Father' or Pater Noster.

This prayer was taught by Jesus Christ in the gospels of Matthew and Luke. In this newsletter, we reflect on some of the ideas around the Lord's Prayer that we will also discuss in worship and in our weekly bible study. Below I want to share some variations on the traditional translation of the Lord's Prayer.

First of all, let us acknowledge that for many of people, the versions of the prayer that we learned and prayed in our different expressions of Christianity are already comfortable. Even beloved. We share this prayer in common, even if the language varies slightly based on our roots.

The basic variations are minimal. For instance, we may use words such as trespasses, debts, or sins. The Catholic version does not include the doxology 'for thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, forever' within the body of the prayer, but addresses it later in the liturgy. By contrast, Protestants tend to combine the prayer and doxology as a single element of worship.

Please be reassured that Jesus taught us one model for how to pray. He did not instruct that we had to pray in the same exact words. Rather we are taught that every conversation offered to Godself is valid and authentic; pray as you are moved and inspired to do. Use familiar words. Use new words. Use silence or song. Pray with eyes closed and hands clasped, on your knees and head bowed, or pray with eyes wide open while walking in the woods. There are many ways to pray. Yet we're focusing on this prayer for as we enter Lent, and invite you to do so, too.

To revisit a known text such as the Lord's Prayer — which is often spoken from memory, by rote, each week — is to rediscover this prayer anew. For several weeks, in worship, study and weekly reflections, we're visiting this familiar prayer line by line.

Alternately, we may also learn by exploring the same prayer via new imagery and language. Different metaphors and concepts may open up a prayer to become more inclusive for people who have felt excluded from some of its conventional forms. Or it may clarify the meaning of the prayer in new, contemporary language. Take your time with the versions below to find out if you learn something new about a familiar prayer, by reading it in a new way.

Below is the same prayer in many variations. The first version appears in the New Zealand prayer book:

Eternal Spirit, Earth-maker, Pain-bearer, Life-giver, Source of all that is and that shall be, Father and Mother of us all, Loving God, in whom is heaven: the hallowing of your name echo through the universe!

The way of your justice be followed by the peoples of the world!

Your heavenly will be done by all created beings!

Your commonwealth of peace and freedom sustain our hope and come on earth.

With the bread we need for today, feed us. In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us.

In times of temptation and test, strengthen us. From trials too great to endure, spare us.

From the grip of all that is evil, free us.

For you reign in the glory of the power that is love, now and forever. Amen.

Another version was provided by minister and theologian Parker Palmer:

Heavenly Father, heavenly Mother, Holy and blessed is your true name. We pray for your reign of peace to come, We pray that your good will be done, Let heaven and earth become one.

Give us this day the bread we need, Give it to those who have none.

Let forgiveness flow like a river between us, from each one to each one.

Lead us to holy innocence beyond the evil of our days.

Come swiftly Mother, Father, come. For yours is the power and the glory and the mercy:

Forever your name is All in One. Amen.

The version remains unattributed, but its simplicity may make it understandable:

Loving God, in whom is heaven, may Your name be honored everywhere. May Your kin-dom come.

May the desire of Your heart for the world be done, in us, by us and through us.

Give us the bread we need for each day. Forgive us. Enable us to forgive others.

Keep us from all anxiety and fear. For You reign in the power that comes from love which is Your glory forever and ever. Amen.

This translation comes from the Nazarene tradition, based on they report as 'original Aramaic'. It has been interpreted through a contemporary lens and may speak deeply to some people who are straddling multiple traditions or ways of being in the world:

O cosmic Birther, from whom the breath of life comes, who fills all realms of sound, light and vibration.

May Your light be experienced in my utmost holiest. Your Heavenly Domain approaches.

Let Your will come true in the universe (all that vibrates) just as on earth (that is material and dense).

Give us wisdom (understanding, assistance) for our daily need, detach the fetters of faults that bind us, (karma) like we let go the guilt of others.

Let us not be lost in superficial things (materialism, common temptations), but let us be freed from that what keeps us off from our true purpose.

From You comes the all-working will, the lively strength to act, the song that beautifies all and renews itself from age to age. Sealed in trust, faith and truth. (I confirm with my entire being)

May you find something beloved, either in the original version of the prayer that you have always said, or in one of these variations, that helps you connect with Holy Love.







Did you know....

The Charitable IRA Rollover, also known as a Qualified Charitable Disbursement (QED) allows Americans age 70 ½ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!



Have you considered naming Jackson Community Church in your estate plans?

Everyone has the capacity to leave a legacy – large or small – to the organizations that they care about most. There are many simple ways you can make a lasting gift to the church. JCC can be named as a beneficiary in your will, IRA, or charitable trust. Chari-
