Brothers and Sisters —

June is a month of growth and beginnings. Blossoms brighten the landscape. Bees explore early flowers, gathering pollen and feeding new generations. Gardens rise up, green and lush with promise.

People share such verdant life with each other. We pass along seeds and cuttings that have been handed down from family to family,

generation to generation, neighbor to neighbor, yard to yard. We eat the fruit, savor the flowers, and stand in the shade of each other's stories.

Some of us are connected to deeply-rooted life that keeps us in one location: one geographic place that we call home. For others, seedlings and stories are portable; we travel with dogeared pages and soil-filled pots containing small samples of our origins.

The gleanings of our gardens, like our stories, go with us. Whether we stay nearby or travel afar, people are marking milestones and accomplishments. For instance, young people (and sometimes venerable folk, too) celebrate graduation from high school and college. As summer comes, individuals and families launch new adventures: jobs, internships, seasonal work, vacations, camps, retirement, volunteer roles ... unknown futures and next steps!

Others are saying farewell. Deaths, challenging diagnosis, end of careers or relationships, and other changes in circumstances cause people to make major moves. Some are arriving here in our valley while others are leaving in all sorts of ways. Sometimes a patch of beloved leaf and familiar soil, to signify home and/or connection, helps us through such transitions.

As you take time in your garden and throughout your summer journeys, let the prophet Isaiah come with you. Connect to ancient spiritual stories, as well as contemporary narratives. After many challenges and hardships, the people to whom Isaiah spoke, and for whom he advocated, learned to "look with their eyes, and listen with their ears, and comprehend with their minds, and turn and be healed." Isaiah's words fell upon reluctant soil, yet his message took root over time. For his own people, Isaiah's story cultivated resilience and gratitude over hundreds of years among homesick exiles, forcibly removed to distant lands, oppressed and ensnared, disconnected from culture and kindred, without social home or spiritual center. As we read Isaiah's words this month, they are handed down over millennia, carrying a sense of home and hope, of belonging combined with new beginnings. May his message flourish in us, too.

Along with this ancient truth-teller, listen for modern-day prophets this summer. Whose questions and insights work within the fertile loam of your mind and spirit, taking hold and cultivating transformation? Is it a songwriter or poet? An artist or journalist? A public figure who makes headlines and demonstrates extraordinary leadership? Or is it someone unexpected and local? Could it be a neighbor who shows up, day after day, with care and concern for nearby issues or homegrown concerns? Might it be someone recovering from addiction or living with a lifethreatening diagnosis, who has gained a new appreciation for and perspective about life? Or could your prophet be a young child with fresh questions and keen observations? Look for prophets, for stories, for the seeds of change, in church and in our community. This summer, who helps you pay attention? Who notices you? Whom do you notice? Commencement speakers are sure to reflect on social conditions in the next few weeks. During Pride month, our church will sponsor a booth at Pride Festival, giving away free lemonade and offering plenty of spiritual solidarity with our LGBTQ+ community; we'll certainly witness prophetic people choosing to speak out about their experiences. Meanwhile, during June we look forward to the insights of Mr. Mt. Washington Valley, Dan Lavigne, on Father's Day: he will reflect on faith, fatherhood, and the causes about which he is passionate. As Independence Day approaches, the Rev. Bill Briggs will lead two Sundays of worship, sharing stories about his own revolutionary way of living out his faith.

Finally, we invite you to begin your summer with another prophet's deep questions, shared from her own corner of the natural world. Let poet Mary Oliver, or the prophet Isaiah, or some other truth-teller, become the catalyst of growth in your life. This summer, may your life, and your soul, become a garden in bloom.

In the glare of your mind, be modest. And beholden to what is tactile, and thrilling. Live with the beetle, and the wind.


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The Leaf and the Cloud (excerpt from a booklength poem) — Mary Oliver

Donations will be accepted all month long even a small donation combined with ALL other UCC Churches can make a big difference.

What is One Great Hour of Sharing?



One Great Hour of Sharing channels resources for international programs in health, education and agricultural development, emergency relief, refugee ministries, and both international and domestic disaster responses. It is administered by Wider Church Ministries, Global Sharing of Resources.

This years OGHS theme is It's Time To Share and your generosity makes all the difference.

An example of where One Great Hour of Sharing helps is in Nueva Frontera, Honduras. In Nueva Frontera (New Frontier) and other rural areas in the department of Santa Bárbara, Honduras, a new program is unfolding, and has already reached 500 families. The program has helped Esmerelda Robles, a 27-year-old wife, mother, and farmer who lives in the Macuelizo region. She has benefitted greatly from the installation of an eco-stove which has significantly reduced the soot that previously covered her home. "Before, I had a permanent cough," Esmerelda says. "Now, with just a load of firewood, you cook, you don't need much (unlike the stove we had before), and it is very helpful for our lungs that there is no smoke."

Additionally, Esmerelda was part of a "pass chain" activity in the program, where she received several foster animals. This activity consists of a family receiving a pregnant pig, sheep, or cow and feeding and caring for it. When the next piglet, lamb, or calf is born, it is passed on to another family, which in turn will do the same. Esmerelda describes her village as "a beautiful place with friendly people, with good coexistence. We all know each other because we have always been there. I was born and raised here."

This is just one example on how your generous donations can help. This collection will be ongoing for the month of June.

Did you know....



The Charitable IRA Rollover, also known as a Qualified Charitable **Disbursement (QED)** allows Americans age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!



Have you considered naming Jackson Community Church in your estate plans?

Everyone has the capacity to leave a legacy – large or small – to the organizations that they care about most. There are many simple ways you can make a lasting gift to the church. JCC can be named as a beneficiary in your will, IRA, or charitable trust. Chari-

table Gift Annuities are available through the United Church of Christ that will provide you with income for life, a tax deduction, and a substantial gift to the church in the future.
