July was the month when we meditated on liberation and freedom. Summer is that season when we feel set loose to explore and renew.

As I was reminded at the national Synod of the UCC, "None of us are free, until all of us are free." Here are a few questions to ponder over the next several weeks. Who needs more support and alliance in order to achieve full access to freedom? What does civil freedom promise us?

What does spiritual freedom look like? What must be present in our society to sustain freedom and to advance it? Where must our own nation continue to grow to provide full freedom to all of its residents?

Of course, Rev. Bill Briggs brought you his perspective the first two Sundays of July. His focus always includes social justice; enjoy his stories and messages!

Many of us are making summer pilgrimages, journeys, and trips ... some to faraway places, some to destinations within ourselves. Some are for healing. Some are for learning. Some are for letting go. Some are for work. Some are for play. Some are for respite. Some are for reconnecting. Some are for saying goodbye. Some are for fun. Some are for creativity. Some are for seeking. Some are simply to bring us home again, full of deeper appreciation for what awaits us in this corner of the world.

In our spiritual journeys this season, may we become comfortable and 'at home' with ourselves. May we have compassion for our own and each others' flaws and shortcomings, and confidence that we are all fully beloved children of God.

May we also expand our understanding of who is our neighbor and what 'home' means to us. Whether we are traveling or close to home, we can bear witness to human suffering and struggle. It is everywhere. So is humanity's resilient response, in every place, with compassion and creativity.

As the prophet Isaiah, whom we have been reading the past month, says, "Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the straps of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly." These words call us to consider whom our neighbors and kindred may be. Please note that how we support at-risk folks doesn't require putting ourselves in danger or crossing boundaries (unless we have jobs that prepare us for such work). Yet it might include rethinking how we direct our attention and compassion and where we put our resources to make a difference in the lives of vulnerable neighbors. Jesus restated this principle quite eloquently when he said, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me."

Meanwhile, enjoy 'home' whether you remain nearby for the summer or return after colorful journeys. Also remain open to what it means to be 'at home' with yourself.

Savor these words from poet and theologian Jan Richardson. What phrases resonate for you? What speaks to you? Find a gift within her writing that helps you perceive home in a new and different way.

as doors deeper in.


Pray for protection.

JACKSON-BARTLETT GRIEF GROUP

Now that we've met a few times, and received feedback, we will formally split meetings into two distinct grief groups. Each group will begin by meeting once a month. Some participants may have experienced both kinds of loss, and can choose where it is most meaningful to participate.

Note that a few DATES have changed.

CHILD LOSS GROUP: Will meet once per month. Specifically for household who has experienced the death of a child of any age (minor or adult). Currently we're using the 1pm, Wednesday time slot. Upcoming dates: 1pm on Wed, Aug 16, Sept 13.

PARTNER/SPOUSE & ADULT FAMILY MEMBER LOSS: Will meet once per month. This group will focus on partner/spouse loss, although it is also a safe place for those experiencing loss of a parent or other adult relation. Currently we're using the 1pm, Wednesday time slot at old red library in Jackson. Upcoming dates: 1pm on Wed, Aug 23, Sept 27.

At this point, new participants are welcome through word-of-mouth or referrals. We'll meet as consistently as possible. You don't have to attend every session. On the other hand, knowing that folks will gather helps make sure the group can be present to support each other. *If you cannot make an upcoming gathering, please let email or text to let the group know: gaildoktor@mac.com, cell:* 978.273.0308. We will offer each group as long as the community need continues.

Both groups are free, and open to the community. Rev. Gail Doktor, trained as a hospice chaplain, will facilitate. Pass along this info to anyone whom you know, who might need such a support network. We're operating word of mouth and enews only. One caution: if a family is newly-bereaved (the death happened within the past 6 weeks), it's usually too soon to attend this group. After about 6 weeks, such gatherings can be more beneficial (based on best practices of hospice-facilitated grief groups).

Cake Mix Cookies

1 15oz. box of cake mix 2 large eggs 1/3 cup canola oil Stir to combine. Scoop 1 ½ Tbl. Dough onto lined cookie sheet

Bake 350 10 to 12 minutes until lightly golden around the bottom

Linda used lemon cake mix and they were VERY good. Chocolate is also good.



Did you know....

The Charitable IRA Rollover, also known as a Qualified Charitable Disbursement (QED) allows Americans age 70 ½ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!



Have you considered naming Jackson Community Church in your estate plans?

Everyone has the capacity to leave a legacy – large or small – to the organizations that they care about most. There are many simple ways you can make a lasting gift to the church. JCC can be named as a beneficiary in your will, IRA, or charitable trust. Chari-

table Gift Annuities are available through the United Church of Christ that will provide you with income for life, a tax deduction, and a substantial gift to the church in the future.
