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Ministers Report

January 2023

Friends & Members of Jackson Community Church —

As 2024 begins, we add this 2023 overview and annual report to the many ways we re-visit our history and tell our story anew as a church and community.

For instance, we spent time, and will continue to do so, caring for the wellbeing of the church as a building and also the church and its neighbors as a community of people. As Isaiah once wrote for God's people, *"Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in."* This is a wonderful metaphor for the work and play of our village church in these times. This promise also presumes that we remain in relationship with God and choose God's Way. As children of God, we can imagine that these words are offered for our time and our community, too. Certainly Jackson Community Church is going back to basics, strengthening our foundations, opening our doors wider, and setting the keystone of our spiritual home for years to come.

Always, the deeper question becomes, with what will we fill the heights of the sanctuary, the chambers of our hearts, and the span of our lives?

Last year, church leaders and staff dug into the process of transforming our church's governance model to become more proactive and aspirational. Consequently, our 2024 governing Council will change its focus, so that it becomes a more inspired and strategic group who asks deep questions and works on near-term and long-term objectives. Additionally, last autumn we commenced the 'Appreciative Inquiry' process with a consultant, interviewing individuals and groups to gather stories, strengths, and hopes for Jackson Community Church. That work continues as well. At the same time, a handful of representatives from our church also joined a cohort of small churches in New England working on resiliency through a program called Refugia offered by the BTS Center. This approach to church vitality challenges us to grow deeper rather than grow bigger, acknowledg-ing that we are small-sized churches who thrive in unique ways. In all of these initiatives, and others we undertake this coming year, we support growth and change in an era when many small churches struggle and close.

As stewards of a landmark structure, we celebrate the completion of renovations and improvements to the exterior of the building. In 2022, we painted and repaired elements on the belfry and steeple, as well as all the facades of the historic sanctuary building and the Parish Hall annex. Note that the shutters are now installed correctly; they used to be upside down! In December 2023, the final phase of this exterior restoration project was completed with the construction and installation of a new sign near the front entrance. All of this work was completed with much contribution of time and material by church friends and members, as well as the work of professional contractors. Learn more details in the Building Team's update.

Throughout these projects and processes, we have continued to BE the church by caring for each other and our neighbors. Different reports within this overview share how the Missions team served local and global causes, how our church social life has revived, and many ways we have thrived together. We gather to worship and study. We serve the wider community hands-on. We play and socialize together! Our sanctuary stays open to everyone all day, every day, throughout the year.



Minister's Report (Con't)

This church is more than its bylaws or its walls. Our village church — working alongside many other congregations and nonprofit organizations — remains vibrant and relevant, because we act on our beliefs and values. We continue to help provide care for neighbors and residents in Jackson and Bartlett and throughout the Mt Washington Valley. Our responses are specific, tangible, and meaningful, whether we offer gatherings for bereaved people, deliver community care packages as part the Whitney Center initiative, offer engaging cultural programs, build ecumenical and interfaith relationships, sing and walk and hike and climb to support local causes that range from cancer prevention, curing Alzheimers, aiding asylum-seekers and rescuing animals to tackling regional homelessness. Much of what we accomplish occurs in partnership with other faith communities and in collaboration with local civic partners. In some cases, we also work with international partners. Together, the church's staff, members, and friends serve as part of an ongoing social and spiritual safety net.

Jackson Community Church follows the Way that Christ taught us; this is the path to which we are called. As a community church — as people of faith — our focus includes humanitarian compassion, environmental stewardship, loving perspective, and the hard work of hope. As you read, the pages of this report recount the one year in a much longer story. May we continue to add new chapters to the great, holy story of Holy Love walking and working in the world.

Moderator's Report

My first attempt at writing up the past year for the JCC Annual Report included my farewell as moderator of the council. However, after much prayerful reflection, I have decided to stay on for another year. Why you may ask? In reflecting on the past year, I realized that the best is yet to come and I'd like to be a part of it. This is an exciting time for the Jackson Community Church and congregation and I encourage everyone to take part, get involved and explore new and different ways to contribute to this dynamic church community.

Prior to the pandemic, the Jackson Community Church voted to suspend its by-laws. These were the standard bylaws set forth by the UCC and adopted by the church. Following them would require approximately 65 people to hold various volunteer positions. Then, our church, along with many others, faced the challenge of serving its membership, while dealing with a global pandemic and its restrictions and cautions. Now, more than three years later, it's time to face a new challenge of revising and reinstating a set of bylaws that better 'fit' our church and church family.

Through a process known as Appreciative Inquiry, the Council is developing a more strategic and streamlined way to operate for both the near and distant future. Another group is working on a process known as Refugia – again to look at the future of the church and move towards becoming an Open and Affirming congregation that serves EVERYONE.

Two sessions were held in November to begin the process outlined in Appreciative Inquiry and between the two sessions about 30 people participated. If you attended one of these sessions – Thank you. If you missed them, it's not too late to get involved. There will be more opportunities to get involved and provide input as we shape the future of the church so keep your ears, hearts and minds open to listen, learn and contribute to new ideas.

Our dynamic church does a great deal and continues to contribute to the local as well as the greater Mt. Washington Valley community. We support Zimbabwe through our mission committee, another successful plant sale provided funds for Ukraine and the Way Station helped ensure the safety of our local homeless population after the recent flooding. As a congregation, we once again helped provide a Merry Christmas to children through Angels and Elves and this year's Hanukkah celebration was well-received by all attendees and was a welcomed respite given the unrest in the Middle East. We finished painting and got a new signboard, and the choir began rehearsing in time for Christmas. This list goes on and on.

One of my favorite holiday movies is "It's a Wonderful Life" and as I reflect over the past year, I realized "We're a Wonderful Church" with a strong congregation, that steps up when needed; much like George Bailey's friends stepped up to support him. As we move into the New Year, I hope you will step up, and get involved. When you look back, as I did when I first started this, you'll realize how much your gifts are appreciated and how they make a difference.

Wishing you a New Year overflowing with health, happiness, joy and peace.

The meeting began at 7:00 with a prayer from Rev. Gail Doktor

Meg Phillips has agreed to Moderate the meeting. This is the 2022 Annual Meeting where we approve what has happened in 2022 and plan for 2023.

Roll Call

Approval of Congregational Mtg Minutes:

- 2021 Annual Meeting Minutes: Motion to approve Jeanette (1st), Linda Gray (2 nd), all in favor.
- Approval of Council Actions for 2022: Motion to approve Lee (1st) Sandy (2nd) all in favor

Approval of Clerks Report:

- Joanne read the Clerks report. Discussion: Was there a review of inactive members for 2022? The Deacons review the potential inactive members then Joanne reviews if there has been a financial contribution in the past year. There were no members added to be considered inactive for this meeting.
- Motion to approve the Clerks Report: Joyce Allan (1st) Linda Gray (2nd) all in favor

Treasurers Report (Joanne Turner reported for Donna Dunn)

- The year ended up pretty much were we expected it to be.
- Our income was higher than projected, which can be attributed to the generosity of our member support.
- With additional donations to the pastors discretionary fund, Rev. Gail was able to help many people with one time needed or emergency expenses.
- We tried to minimize expenses where we could, however, we spent a little more than anticipated on infrastructure repairs and improvements. We had unexpected Chairlift and Sprinkler System issues that needed attention.

2023 Budget (Joanne Turner)

- (Jeanette) Line item 4091 Income Parking Supplement. Has anyone contacted the Wentworth to request payment per the agreement. (Joanne) Rev. Gail was in contact with the Assistant General Manager and a letter was sent requesting the donation.
- (Jeanette) Line item 6155 Expenses- Membership and Church Life. Is there a reason we are keeping the funds in the budget? (Gail) We are resuming fellowship activities on a regular basis. (Cheryl) We are leaving the funds in there for supplies as well.



- (Jeanette) Line item 6424 Expense Organist IT Supplement. Do we still need this? Is Sharon capable or available to do IT? No. We can remove this \$250 from the budget.
- (Jeanette) Line item 6910 Expense Oil & Propane. Given the current cost of fuel should we
 increase this amount. (Joanne) We are currently on a budget program and have a significant
 credit with White Mountain Oil. We should be ok with the current budget.
- (Cheryl) Did we include funds to update the technology in the Sanctuary? (Joanne) Line item 6725 Expense has \$2,000 allocated to technology under Church Improvements.
- (Joanne) An infrastructure expense that we were unaware at the time of the budget being approved to be presented at the Annual Meeting at the December Council Meeting involves the sprinkler system. It has been discovered that the sprinkler system has some air leaks which has been causing the compressor to not hold the pressure that is needed in case the power goes out. This was discovered the weekend in December that Jackson lost power. Within 3 hours of loosing power the system was in danger and luckily Rev. Gail was around to shut the system down with the help of Pope Security and the Jackson Fire Department. This could be a very costly problem if it happens again and there is no one nearby that can safely turn the system down. The cost to repair a pipe in November and the emergency visit to get the system back up and running has been almost \$3,000. We should add some funds to the current budget to assess and repair any current leaks. (Peter Benson) We should add an additional \$5,000 to the current budget, which is a small amount to potentially stop a larger more expensive issue. (Linda Gray) This is a no brainer obviously prevention is the way to go. Motion to add \$5,000 to the budget Wendy (2nd) All in favor.
- Motion to accept the Finance Report and the amended 2023 Budget (remove \$250 from Organist IT supplement and add \$5,000 to Sprinkler Maintenance) Tim Scott (1st) Sandy Louis (2nd) All in favor.

Trustees' Report: (Jim Hastings)

- A warning that the results from 2022 are not very pretty. Thank you to Roy Lundquist and Bob Griffin for being active on the committee.
- As of December 31, 2022 we have over \$2,450,000 in investable funds. The good news is that as of today the valuation has increased by \$23,000.
 The Olive Godfrey Scholarship has awarded 14 scholarships for a total of \$28,000. Scholarship funds are available to Jackson residence and do not have to be used strictly for college.
- 2022 Return on assets: We lost \$488,000 which is loss in market value less dividends. Last year our profit was \$477,000. We paid \$16,000 in fees which average for the year to .58 percent.
- Performance vs Benchmark: FL Putnam did not beat the benchmark for the year. JCC loss was 16.1% while the benchmark was 12.9%. FL Putnam tends to do much better in an inclining market.
- The current portfolio consists of fixed 24%, Equities 58%, Exchange traded (mutual) 15%, Alternatives (real estate, gold, silver ect) 1% and cash 2%.
- Our ESG (Environmental, Social and Governance). FL Putnam philosophy is that it looks for good companies which tend to perform better on the ESG scale. Our ESG is 7.0 out of 10 compared to S&P Index with 6.5 out of 10.
- Thank you again to Roy Lundquist for the time, energy and many years of service to the trustees.
- Motion to accept the Trustees report: Sue Carrigan (1st) Peter Benson (2nd) all approved.

Thank you to Roy Lundquist who is stepping down as a Trustee. There are a few people interested in this role and the council will discuss at a further meeting. The council will call a special meeting in March for recommendations to fill the roles.
- Motion to approve slate of officers and volunteers all approved.

- (Rev. Gail) If you read the Annual Report you may have noticed that Joanne and I have written most of the reports. We are at a growing spot at the church and we need more volunteers to help. We have purchased multiple copies of the book : Governance in Ministry and would like council and others to take a look at it and see how it can help the JCC.
- (Meg) If you are passionate about this then being a Council Member at Large will be a great start.
- (Rev. Gail) We are exploring the process of being more inclusive. If you are interested in this we have some training and learning sessions coming up.
- (Meg) Thank you to Rev. Gail for her tremendous work and compassion.

Mission Champions

The Mission Team has had a rewarding and successful year. We met and planned for numerous activities and communicated in person, by emails, by phone and through zoom at regular intervals.

Again, Linda Hastings was chair, Jeanette Heidmann was treasurer, Kit Griffin secretary, Gloria Hutchings our connection to the Jackson Bridge and Birdy Ellsmore and Sue Carrigan our connection to the Food Pantry, Gibson Center and Way Station. Claire was our lead person for Jen's Friends Climb Against Cancer. We were all pleased to have Sue Carrigan join our team.

Goals

Our group is interested in local, national, and global projects. We feel the mission work is the lifeblood of the church and helps the church to be part of the community. Plans for the year included: 1. Publish information about the Mission Committee activities in the monthly edition of Inside-Out. 2. Give regular presentations in church about our mission work. 3. Encourage members to be involved in our mission projects and fundraising activities.

We continued our support of the Way Station. Rev. Gail and Jeanette continue to be actively involved as members of the board. Sue and other members of the church are involved with sorting and delivering food, as well as with other activities. Members of the church participated in a meal prepared by Lillian, the mother of the family living at the Way Station. We had a baby shower at the church for the Honduran family.

We sent donations from our allocated funds to the 5x5 charities listed below. In June we asked the congregation for additional donations for One Great Hour of Sharing.

Early in the year we raised \$765 to be sent for Turkish earthquake relief. The Mission Team added another \$100.

In April we sent \$3600 to Zimbabwe to continue work on their church and another \$400 for additional needs.

Members of the committee met with the organizers of the Food Pantry in hopes of involving more families in need. Most of us have volunteered during the two Saturday mornings a month that the food pantry is open. We helped organize food items for a complete Thanksgiving meal for 25 local families.

During the year we collected and delivered needed food, clothes, and personal items to the Way Station, Jackson/Bartlett Food Pantry, and the Gibson Center. We delivered numerous 2024 calendars to the Gibson Center for their clients.



Mission Champions (con't)

Our plant sale was a tremendous success! The community gave us wonderful support by both donating and purchasing plants. We received donations from Lucy's, Home Depot, Lowe's and Dutch Bloemen Winkel. We were able to raise a total of \$1712. We sent \$300 to the Nativity Church for the Ashlee assistance fund in support of the Honduran family living at the Way Station and the remaining money was sent to The Common Man Ukraine Fund. Our theme this year was refugee relief and support.

Claire did a great job in organizing our church family for the Jen's Friends Climb against Cancer in September. We were able to raise \$4078! Some members joined the Jen's Friend's fundraiser and played mini golf at Pirate's Cove. Claire also organized workers at the JCC booth for White Mountain Pride Day where JCC teamed up with the Lutheran Church. Donations from both booths totaled about \$300 which was donated to Kennett High School LGBTQ+ support.

Jeanette organized a group on the trails at Great Glen as a fundraiser for Alzheimer's research.

In November we sponsored a family of 3 children through Angels and Elves. The congregation provided needed and wanted clothing and toys for the children. We purchased poinsettias to leave after caroling and donated money to the Whitney Center for their community friendship baskets.

We were able to send money to Honduras in December to purchase a few street lights.

Our total budget this year was \$11,800. From that budget we allocated 32% to local projects, 2% to National projects, 21% to conference projects, 41% to international projects with 4% unallocated for emergencies or carry over to next year.

During the year we supported: MWV Supports Recovery (substance abuse), Alzheimer's Assoc., Jen's Friends, One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need, Our Church's Wider Mission, The Clergy Christmas Fund, and Strengthening the Church. Trustees of Trust Funds

Trustees of Trust Funds 2023

The Trustees of Trust Funds are responsible for investment and administration of all moneys given to the Jackson Community Church in trust. The trustees met twice in 2023; in May to award scholarships and in September to review the investments with Rob Breed of F. L. Putnam, the organization's financial advisor. One step taken this year to protect the integrity of the Trust Fund was to review the Investment Policy Statement ("IPS"). During 2023, no changes were made. The current guidelines are: 1) Fixed Income to be 20% to 50% of the portfolio, 2) Equities (50 - 70%), 3) Alternatives (0 - 10%), and 4) Cash (0 - 10%).

The table below shows the amounts in each fund and the transactions therein for the last few years. In addition to the amounts listed below, there is \$753 in a Northway Bank checking account which is primarily used for disbursements of scholarship awards.

Contributions to any of the funds are welcome. Checks can be made to the Jackson Church with a designation to the Trustees and naming the fund to be supported.

The Funds of the Trustees and their purposes are listed below:

The Jackson Church Investment Fund

Funds from the Jackson Church Investment Fund are disbursed for use in church operations.

The Olive Z. Godfrey Scholarship Fund

The Olive Z. Godfrey Scholarship awarded \$28,000 to 17 students during 2023 for the 2023 - 2024 school year to the following Jackson residents: Amanda Anzaldi, Jocelyn Anzaldi, Braedon Bailey, Camden Bailey, Bradely Cole, Bradley Finn, Amy Grace Burton, Benjamin Dougherty, Jocelyn Henry, Marissa Henry, Madelyn Marcotte, Meghan Marcotte, Rosalie Sherlock, Erin Stokes, Danielle Watson, Maeve Weeder, and Caleb White.

The Marjorie T. March Mission Fund

The Trustees oversee the investment of the March Mission Fund with the Mission Committee administering the operations of the Fund.

The Chadbourne Bequest

During 2023, the Trustees acknowledge that at least forty worship services were held in the Jackson Community Church which meets the conditions set forth by the Bequest. Any disbursements from the fund are expended primarily on capital updates relating directly to the historic structure, parsonage, meeting room and church offices.

The William K. Norton and Lilla M. Pond Memorial Fund

The William K. Norton and Lilla M. Pond Memorial Fund was established to support the general operations of the Jackson Community Church.



The Capital Reserve Fund

The Capital Reserve Fund is used to assist in providing financial resources in major, non-recurring building maintenance of the church

The Parsonage Fund

The Parsonage Fund was established for the purpose of assisting in providing housing support for the minister. Proceeds of the sale of the parsonage were used to establish this fund.

The Chikanga Partnership Fund

The Chikanga Partnership Fund is to provide ongoing support in construction and maintenance efforts to the Chikanga Partner Church in Zimbabwe. The Trustees oversee the investment of the Chikanga Partnership Fund with the Mission Committee administering the operations of the Fund. Disbursements are prohibited if the Fund balance is less than \$50,000.

All the funds in the savings account are restricted and are not included in budget projections, these funds are held for specific purposes. Over the past couple of years there have been many generous donors contributing to the Pastors Discretionary fund in order for Rev. Gail to help those in need around the Mount Washington Valley. These funds are kept separately in the savings account until the pastor requests funds to be confidentially distributed. In 2023 the Minister's Restricted account accessed \$ 4,963.72 in funds to help those in need and \$3,993.04 to help those with heating assistance.



Memorials are gifts given in memory of friends or family. Most gifts are given in the form of money. Some people want more than a tribute of flowers and a stone in a cemetery to remind them and others of friends or family. The choice of the memorial is often influenced by the interests and commitments of the person in whose memory the gift is given. If there is no choice the gifts are placed in the general memorial fund for items that the church needs or desires. All gifts are recorded in the Memorial Fund book, with acknowledgement to the donor.

The Bushee Thorn Mountain Trust is invested in the Consolidated Investment Fund (CIF) of the NH Conference of the UCC. Dividends from the fund continue to provide "...an opportunity for groups to meet in the ecumenical spirit to foster Christian growth through inspiration, study, fellowship, and recreation." Representatives from the four Mt Washington Valley UCC Churches (Conway, N. Conway, Jackson, and Bartlett) administer the funds. The majority of the fund disbursements are for camp scholarships benefitting youth in the Valley. It also provides a unique opportunity for inter-church projects and events.

Building & Maintenance

Building & Campus Overview

Many improvements occurred for the historic sanctuary and the entire building in 2023. As many folks know from personal experience, tradespeople are extraordinarily busy in the North Country, and clients wait several weeks or months for the completion of projects. We're glad to have finished several such projects over 2023!

Most noticeable is the newly-completed sign at the front of the church. This free-standing sign replaces an older one that was attached to the building. The sign was designed by architect Chris Doktor to echo the historic structure's existing Greek Revival features. The sign was built by Ben Simpson of Tamarack Construction; it features a wooden frame with classic details and copper cap. We extend deep appreciation to the Weeders of Tamarack Construction for the care with this project. Its placement and appearance were approved by the Protestant Chapel Association (PCA). As owners and stewards of the original 1847 structure, the PCA must review and consent to any significant transformations to the historic sanctuary building. Along with the church's investment in the project, we received a grant that provided matching funds from NH's LCHIP/Land & Community Heritage Investment Program. Completing and installing the sign was the final step in a larger exterior improvement initiative which began in 2022 and included exterior painting, repair of wood trim, painting and installation of shutters, repairs to the belfry and steeple, plus the new sign. Significant time and materials were donated by friends and members to conclude this project.

Our fire suppression system was taken offline, until we installed a new compressor and completed repairs to air leaks in the pipes. For several months, the church operated without a working sprinkler system, while we waited for the new compressor. Throughout this time, we followed safety protocols provided by the Jackson Fire Department. Sprinkler Systems of Maine maintains our system; they completed both fixes to the system. The new compressor was installed with the help of electrician Tim DiPietro, and the repair to the pipes was completed with the assistance of Bruce Campbell. We will schedule a leak inspection in 2024 to further evaluate the status of the entire fire suppression system.

Meanwhile, the Nest thermostat for the furnace that warms the sanctuary was hard-wired to a power supply, so that it connects to the furnace at all times and maintains a comfortable level of heat in the sanctuary. This project was coordinated by Stephen Weeder and completed by electrician Tim DiPietro.

Val Willman continues to provide weekly cleaning and care for the interior of the building. She declutters, provides visual order, waters plants, and tries to keep JCC organized, although Rev Gail manages to introduce mess and chaos with every new event, project, and season! Friends and members using the church's facilities, especially the kitchen, are kindly asked to clean up all dishes, pots and pans, food items, etc. they may have used, so that Val can focus on deeper cleaning rather than washing dishes.



Building & Maintenance

Volunteers help with the decoration and appearance of the building throughout the year. A whole team coordinates fresh plants and flowers for the pulpit and sanctuary, this includes Gloria Hutchings, Laurie McAleer, Alice Pepper and others. Wendy McVey and Joyce Allan provide fresh flowers inside and also maintain the window boxes and wreaths for the doors year-round. Additionally, Wendy McVey coordinates the Christmas trees for the front

exterior of the church, which are then put into place and lit by a team of volunteers (this year the Men's Breakfast crew helped).

On the second floor, Joanne Turner's administrative office has been relocated to a larger room with a window and independent heating system. For almost two decades, she worked in a small interior space without a window or its own heating unit! We hope this workspace will be a healthy and cheerful alternative to the office she formerly occupied. Thanks to the Men's Breakfast volunteers for moving her desk, and to Val for brightening up her space with live plants and many organizing tips and tricks.

The church weathered many challenges, including the December 2023 flood that set record heights in Jackson. While the crawl space below part of the sanctuary flooded, the waters receded again. The flooding did not seem to affect the church's structural integrity, and did not rise to a level that would impact the heating or electrical systems. The high ground immediately outside the building remained dry, although waters rose up over the banks of the Ellis river and covered the rear driveway, part of the playground area, and the parking lot.

Did you know that volunteers often remove the trash every week? Thanks to Joanne Turner, the Pizors, and other volunteers for this essential help!

Routine inspections of different systems are coordinated and scheduled with the support of Joanne Turner, the church's administrator. Often the church staff handles straightforward chores such as changing bulbs, checking batteries, etc. A small team of volunteers responds to reported issues.

Read other reports to learn more about the many activities that take place in the church, which is a valuable resource we share generously with the community. Some activities are church-related, such as worship, hospitality, and classes. Some are cultural events such as meals and concerts. Others include Laurie McAleer's weekly fitness classes open to the community, weekly AA meetings, grief groups, homework sessions for local students, use of the council room and Parish Hall by other groups needing project space and/or meeting space, and even overnight hosting of and use of the space by visiting youth groups!

Caring for the long-term integrity of the building by conducting regular visual assessments of its overall condition, and helping to plan future improvements of the interior and exterior, is a volunteer opportunity for those interested in the wellbeing of the church and its campus! We welcome your help; please contact the church office if you'd like to offer time in this area of stewardship for our resources.

Meanwhile, enjoy your time inside and outside this beautiful landmark at the heart of Jackson's village.



After a couple years (post COVID) not sharing a meal, 2023 saw the rebirth of the monthly Men's Breakfast. In recent years (pre-COVID) they met at the Wentworth Hotel. During that time, it was told tale of a time when the men met in the church parlor and prepared breakfast themselves. To honor that tradition, the men have been gathering again at the Jackson Community Church Parish House once a month, with a breakfast prepared by Chris Doktor.

The men have been sharing breakfast, starting in April 2023, followed by May, June, and July. We took a break in August, and have met again in September, October, November, and December. Attendance started at 4 or 5 men and has grown to 8, 9, and even 14 in December! Each month, breakfast is built around a theme. Themes have included "Comfort Food", "Pancakes", "Green Eggs and Ham", and "Christmas Casserole" (replete with Santa and Grinch fruit kabobs). Although themes change each month, the one item every can always count on is bacon!

In December the men were given "projects" afterwards, which included moving Joanne's desk to her new office, and stringing the lights on the Christmas trees out in front of the church. Another tradition is to choose a local member of the community and write a note from the group, sent with well wishes and a group photo.

The men's breakfast will resume in January 2024. There is no "regular" schedule, except when the host will be in Jackson. Look for the next breakfast to be announced in the JCC newsletter, email and online. We look forward to welcoming all men in the valley to share food and fellowship.
