April 2024

Friends — April arrives. Out of winter, spring. Out of sleep, awakening. Out of death, new life.

As we enter spring, its coming may be experienced as a form of recurring resurrection. The earth warms and softens, trees grow green, seasonal birds sing, tender shoots appear, and dormant critters rouse from long sleep.

Wendell Berry wrote an essay about topsoil conservation, and its connection to spring and renewal. Berry states, "It is hard to believe that the land we live on and the lives we live are the gifts of death. Yet that is so and it is the topsoil that makes it so." To live close to the rhythms of nature is to embrace what is sacred around us. Berry further observes, "The soil is the great connector of lives, the source and destination of all. It is the healer and restorer and resurrector, by which disease passes into health, age into youth, death into life. Without proper care for it we can have no community, because without proper care for it we can have no life." *Topsoil sounds Christ-like, doesn't it? Even the earth becomes an extension of the body of Christ, of the presence of the Creator.*

Consider the softening earth beneath your feet. Berry writes often about the natural world, and connects it to his understanding of the creative force — God, Spirit, and Christ — that defines his understanding of all that is holy in this world. Intrinsically, we know that our world is sacred. After all, the White Mountains serve as an outdoor cathedral. We often experience sacred moments in connection to the natural world.

The poet Mary Oliver also focuses on the wild world and brings its inhabitants to our attention. Think of birds and other creatures as heaven's messengers, calling us to notice the world we inhabit.

Spring — Mary Oliver

In the north country now it is spring and there Is a certain celebration. The thrush Has come home. He is shy and likes the Evening best, also the hour just before Morning; in that blue and gritty light he Climbs to his branch, or smoothly Sails there. It is okay to know only One song if it is this one. Hear it Rise and fall; the very elements of you should Shiver nicely. What would spring be Without it? Mostly frogs. But don't worry, he Arrives, year after year, humble and obedient And gorgeous. You listen and you know You could live a better life than you do, be Softer, kinder. And maybe this year you will Be able to do it. Hear how his voice Rises and falls. There is no way to be Sufficiently grateful for the gifts we are Given, no way to speak the Lord's name Often enough, though we do try, and

Especially now, as that dappled breast Breathes in the pines and heaven's Windows in the north country, Now spring has come, Are opened wide.

This April, moving through a tender and transforming world, be appreciative and aware of your corner of creation. Such mindfulness becomes a prayerful act. The earth has revealed herself, becoming soft, messy, and vulnerable. As Berry says, this soil "is the healer and restorer and resurrector." And as Oliver suggests, may our lives, like our windows, open wide to connect with the awakening, quickening world. This earth, as much as the people on it, represents the body of God, broken and wounded, in need of healing and new life. *In the wake of Easter, may we grow as faithful followers of the Way, tending to the people and the world around us.*

- Energy bars, fruit drink boxes, fruit cups, peanut butter, shelf stable milk, wrapped crackers



Did you know....



The Charitable IRA Rollover, also known as a Qualified Charitable **Disbursement (QED)** allows Americans age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!



Have you considered naming Jackson Community Church in your estate plans?

Everyone has the capacity to leave a legacy – large or small – to the organizations that they care about most. There are many simple ways you can make a lasting gift to the church. JCC can be named as a beneficiary in your will, IRA, or charitable trust. Chari-

table Gift Annuities are available through the United Church of Christ that will provide you with income for life, a tax deduction, and a substantial gift to the church in the future.

Jackson Community Church is fortunate to have several trust funds that were given by generous church members in the past. We rely on the income from these funds to help balance our budget each year. But we could do much more if we had the resources.
