March 2024

Friends & Neighbors, Brothers & Sisters, Children of God — This month, we take a Lenten journey together. On the first day of March, we explored with Rev. John Heropoulos the development of Christian iconography as a Byzantine art form through its transformation in the Renaissance era. On the final day of March, we

celebrate Easter Sunday.

Each week this month, we follow the Gospel of Mark, through the life and ministry of Jesus, toward the story of Christ's death and resurrection. In the final chapter of Mark, we will join the grieving followers of Jesus, who come to the tomb to find his body. They are startled by the presence of a messenger of heaven. The angel tells them, "He has been raised; he is not here."

This month, we seek to bring alive the Easter story in many ways. What does this narrative, that includes spiritual growth, extreme risk, deep love, profound healing, true service, strained friendship, utter betrayal, miserable mistakes, painful trauma, prolonged death, keen grief, and astonishing hope, mean for us? In what ways do we live, individually and communally, in the shadow of death? What risks and challenges and trials do we endure for love? How do we deeply embrace and live into our ethics and/or our faith? How might we grow spiritually? Where are we holding onto hurt, anger, trauma, and in need of guidance through the process of forgiveness, which is truly a journey of emotional and psychological healing? What parts of ourselves, our relationships, or our community, need to be renewed or restored, that we might experience a kind of resurrection? How do we find ourselves in this holy story of enduring, stubborn, life-affirming, death-defying love?

This month, we explore the holy story from many perspectives through many experiences.

For instance, the Way of the Cross — also called *Via Crucis* or Stations of the Cross — will be addressed with changing installations for the next several weeks. The windows of the church have become the sites of storytelling.

- At the end of February, we welcomed the art of Brian Healy, FAIA, who painted a series of images of our church's steeple, depicting the sun's movement and the sky's moods. The steeple stood, for this artist, as a daily protagonist who endures through events and experiences that might challenge its presence. In these paintings, the steeple persists, stalwart and resilient, regardless of what might come.
- Now during the first weekend of this month, we transitioned from Healy's contemporary paintings of the church to an installation of icons that depict variations on the story of the Way of the Cross, presented in different styles. One series is painted by Janet McKenzie, an artist who includes people of different colors and genders as her models, so that a variety of people may see and find themselves in the story of the cross. Another series is created by classically trained iconographer Kreg Yingst who made woodcut images. A third series, which will be added to the collection once available, will offer miniature icons in the Byzantine tradition.
- Later in March, we will exchange the icons for an installation of crosses from around the world, depicting how people see themselves in the story of the cross. The crosses are made of wood, clay, reeds, metal and other materials. They are carved, painted, and used as canvases to share human encounters with the divine. Some show nature, others show people, and some are bare. Some come from different traditions, from Coptic and Orthodox to Catholic and Celtic.

All of these images of the Way of the Cross are accompanied by guide books. The guide books provide different lenses and perspectives to help people journey with the icons and crosses of the *Via Crucis*. They have been written by popes, immigrants, educators, recovered alcoholics, people healing from trauma, leaders of different vocational movements, and authors who represent different populations. We include guides for families, seniors, children, women, and folks who identify with specific experiences and identities. Guide books help acknowledge and focus on scenarios ranging from sobriety, healing from trauma, recovery from abuse, struggling with betrayal or hurt by the church as an institution, living with mental health differences, and aging to sociocultural identities such as immigrants, LGBTQ+, race and color, and others aspects of human experience. A few guides also tackle global, political, or environmental issues. Some guides offer coloring pages so people can contemplatively travel through the different parts of the Way of the Cross.

Since Lent began, some people have been reading <u>Wild Hope</u> by Gayle Boss, the nature-focused Lenten devotional that is available from the church's library. It is a companion volume to the Advent devotional so many people loved at Christmas. More copies are available for your use. Other study guides, devotionals, and resources are also available: from poetry collections to daily meditations. Some can be downloaded from the church's collection while others are available as hard copies to be borrowed from the church's library in the front entrance (doors open 24/7).

March offers a range of in-person events. Some are social, creative, educational, or recreational. Others are worship-focused. We start with the Byzantine Art lecture at the Whitney Community Center. We follow up with a collaborative Ski, Soup & Vespers evening (an optimistic plan since the snow is melting away as the month begins) hosted at JCC and led by Nativity Lutheran. We're offering a workshop to make felted Easter Eggs. Late in the month, we enter the richness of Holy Week. We begin with the festivity of Palm Sunday, attend a shared Maundy Thursday soup supper and worship experience hosted by Bartlett Congregational Church, offer a Holy Friday vigil in Jackson and participate in an ecumenical Holy Friday service at Nativity Lutheran which will be led by several local clergy. The month culminates with the choice of Jackson's own outdoor Easter sunrise service or our exuberant 10:30am Easter service that offers special instrumental music, choir songs, and flowering of the cross.

Many people report that they are viewing some favorite movies. People love films such as *Jesus Christ Superstar, Godspell*, or even Monty Python's tongue-in-cheek *Life of Brian*. Also, the recent television series *The Chosen* brings the messy, all-too-human experience of Jesus, his followers, and his foes into relatable, poignant focus.

What sort of storytelling speaks to you? Is it poetry? Art? Film or television? Games? Books? Movement or contemplative practices?

Above we have outlined some ways to dive deeper into this season of spiritual growth. Each of us can take this journey quietly and privately, or actively and publicly. Find one way that makes a difference in your life. Join us, reach out to us, or tell us what will support your spiritual journey. May you recognize a character in these stories who reflects your experience, and thus find your connection, along the way, to this story that defines our faith. Together we travel in the shadow of the death, through the challenges and trials of Christ's ministry, to his final days. The stories lead us to the great promise that Love returns, Love rises, and Love restores life even beyond death itself.



## Did you know....

The Charitable IRA Rollover, also known as a Qualified Charitable Disbursement (QED) allows Americans age 70 ½ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70  $\frac{1}{2}$  and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!
