Brothers & Sisters, Friends & Members, Children of God — Greetings as May brings to us the softened earth, migrating birds, welcome rain, and tender greening foliage. For gardeners, the work of turning the earth and cultivating new life is at hand.

Of course, some of our church families have welcomed new life in other ways. We're sharing prayers of hope for the arrival and births of children and grandchildren, and the ongoing wellbeing of those we already cher-

ish. Other households playfully include new pets. Some folks are celebrating upcoming covenants and commitments such as weddings and engagements. Other life milestones abound. Many families are nurturing the dreams and plans of this year's graduates!

Last month, the church savored a sneak preview of the leadership of Rev Walt Hampton, who will be officially ordained at the beginning of May, and has been called as fulltime pastor to First Church, UCC, in North Conway. On communion Sunday this month, May 5, we enjoyed the message and leadership of one of the valley's longest-serving ministers, Sue Davidson. Then on Mother's Day, May 12, Jackson's own Erica Corbett Klein joins us in the role of guest speaker. Erica and her children, who just visited with her husband Christian's family in Brazil, will help shape that day's recognition of the women in our lives, so watch for twins Vivian and George! That day's service will also be facilitated by Meg Phillips. Pentecost arrives on May 19, so please wear red for that 'birthday of the church' gathering, and look for Rev Gail's return from sabbatical.

For gardeners of all kinds, please share the gleanings from your gardens, seedlings, seeds, houseplants, and other green and wonderful abundance with the church! The Mission team's plant sale occurs on Saturday, May 18th, 9am-Noon this year. Proceeds from the sale support International Humanitarian Relief. This event truly marks the fullness of spring as we imagine our growing gardens, yards, and indoor spaces alive with creation's goodness. The complete invitation and guidance for how to drop off donated plants are included in this newsletter.

Additionally, gardens will be the theme of our studies this summer. How many gardens can you recall in the Hebrew Scriptures and Gospel? Do you imagine them as idyllic landscapes, like paradise, or as messy growing places run amok? How do our safe, domesticated gardens connect to the imagery of exuberant, dangerous wilderness? In what ways do our faith traditions use and share the imagery of garden and gardener, and helpfully deepen our connection to the holiness of both our Creator and creation?

A Purification by Wendell Berry

At the start of spring I open a trench in the ground. I put into it the winter's accumulation of paper, pages I do not want to read again, useless words, fragments, errors. And I put into it the contents of the outhouse: light of the sun, growth of the ground, finished with one of their journeys. To the sky, to the wind, then, and to the faithful trees, I confess my sins: that I have not been happy enough, considering my good luck; have listened to too much noise; have been inattentive to wonders; have lusted after praise. And then upon the gathered refuse of mind and body, I close the trench, folding shut again the dark, the deathless earth. Beneath that seal the old escapes into the new. Along the way, as a spiritual practice, we're invited to relinquish the obstacles that discourage and drive us. Contemplating Berry's poem, and as a gardener of your own soul, in practical or spiritual ways, what do you return to the earth, giving back to its origins the remainder of what has been used, rotted, fermented, decayed and/or dying in your life? When you give back such waste, leftovers, and detritus to the earth, you permit them to feed and contribute something more and different.

Then Wendell Berry offers a brief poem about what comes when there's space for new growth, which has been cleared by the composting and purifying he describes above.

For The Future by Wendell Berry


Planting trees early in spring, we make a place for birds to sing in time to come. How do we know? They are singing here now. There is no other guarantee that singing will ever be.

After a purification or purging, when you choose to clean and clear away clutter from your heart, mind, and life, you create nutrient-rich, enriched open space. You invite new seeds, new life. As you cultivate this potential ground and garden, what new discovery, experience, or learning do you welcome? What revitalized love takes root? And how do we, as a community of faith, also compost, repurpose, and upcycle—spiritually—so that we create a cradle to grow more deeply together?

Finally for May, listen to the text of prophet Isaiah, anticipating the renewal of God's people after exile. Let these words come to you as a blessing for the month. From Isaiah 51, *"The LORD will make her deserts like Eden, her wastelands like the garden of the LORD. Joy and gladness will be found in her, thanksgiving and the sound of singing."* After darkness, dormancy, and long sleep, from gestation within the world's womb, life returns. Spring is assuredly upon us. May we embrace its potential!

Come choose from a large selection of locally grown perennials, annuals, seedlings, and houseplants to enhance your home and gardens! **ALL** proceeds from the plant sale will go to support International Humanitarian Relief.

IF you are fortunate enough to have an abundance of plants; perennials that need dividing, extra seedlings, or a healthy houseplant looking for a new home...please consider donating to our sale! If you need pots, please help yourself to the ones under the stairwell at the church.

Please identify all plants dropped off.

Please be aware (from the University Cooperative Extension): There is a new threat to our soil health and successful gardening has emerged on the scene: the jumping worm (Amynthas spp.), also commonly known as the crazy worm and snake worm.

These worms are invasive and cause harm to the soil, unlike other common earthworm species. Jumping worms feed voraciously on the soil organic matter and excrete material that appears grainy, like coffee grounds, which changes the soil chemistry and decreases nutrient availability. This may at times create soil conditions that favor invasive plant species over native plants.



Did you know....



The Charitable IRA Rollover, also known as a Qualified Charitable **Disbursement (QED)** allows Americans age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and older to make gifts to one or more nonprofit organizations (such as Jackson Community Church) without federal tax penalty, by simply requesting a transfer of IRA assets from the plan administrator directly to your charities.

Gifts can be made up to \$100,000 annually and count towards the owner's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for individuals age 72 and older. QCDs from pre-tax IRAs are still a tax-savvy giving strategy in 2021 if you are between age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 72, even though RMDs are not required until age 72.

Consult your tax advisor for the best advice. This is a very painless and tax-advantaged way to support JCC and other favorite charities!



Have you considered naming Jackson Community Church in your estate plans?

Everyone has the capacity to leave a legacy – large or small – to the organizations that they care about most. There are many simple ways you can make a lasting gift to the church. JCC can be named as a beneficiary in your will, IRA, or charitable trust. Chari-
